This year, we did research in Wekweètì and learned a lot from community members. We built a good team and drew on each other's strengths. This report shares the main activities from the research project in 2023.

Wekweètì nàowo ełèts'ele **Research in Wekweètì**

A research team was in Wekweètì in October 2023 to interview community members about their childhoods, their experiences raising children, and their ideas about what is needed for strong future generations.

Ayìı hoghàdeeto What we learned

Important initial findings:

- documentation of how children played in before easy access to mass produced toys and to TV/internet
- documentation of how children learned through observing their parents on the land
- the importance of values like respect and patience in the whole structure of learning
- how to create a strong research team



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
